# Orindans Spring Into Action in Face of Virus

In response to warnings from the White House to Contra Costa County Health Services, Orindans hunkered down as part of a Bay Area shelter in place order declared March 16.

All city meetings, school classes and public events were canceled as residents took measures to protect themselves against the coronavirus.

The Orinda Union School District Board of Trustees voted March 13 to cancel classes and all events through March 27. Spring Break is scheduled for March 30 to April 3.

The district said it had developed an online learning platform for teachers to use, allowing learning to take place from home.

Previously in a message to parents, Superintendent Carolyn Seaton posted that all school events involving more than 50 people would be canceled at least through March 27, including assemblies, field trips, dances, concerts and after-school sports.

Before canceling all meetings, the City Council initially had encouraged people to livestream its regularly scheduled March 17 meeting, view the agenda online, and email questions/comments ahead of time. For those attending, the city planned to space people apart and move people if necessary to an overflow room.

Seniors Around Town, the volunteer program that provides free rides to local seniors, sprung to action. On March 13 SAT launched two programs: One to deliver goods to seniors and the other to check in on them by phone.

SAT Program Coordinator Cathy Goshorn said 19 SAT volunteers immediately agreed to participate, reaching out to 24

One group was set up to go shopping, run critical errands and drop off goods at the doorsteps of seniors' homes. Another was set up to call seniors, see how they are doing and offer reassurance "just to have [SEE VIRUS page 5]

# Road Runners on the Move Since '74

They get up to run at 5:45 a.m. four days ■ a week (7:30 a.m. on the weekends) and among them are folks between 85 and 95 years old. That's the regimen of many who belong to the popular running group, the Orinda Road Runners.

Jerry Wendt and Bob Campbell started the club in 1974 when they were turning 40 and decided they should get back in shape. Road Runners quickly gained a following. Running was beginning to be a more popular sport due to American Frank Shorter winning the Olympic Marathon in 1972.

The group now boasts some 100 members, including five who are turning 85 this year. The oldest is 95. Members have participated in triathlons, marathons, longdistance bike rides and mountain-climbing

Patty Hung has done the Boston Marathon 33 years in a row.

"The secret to a long productive life is to be active, surround yourself with friends, do things together and support one another. That's what we do," said longtime member John Fazel.

Norm Pease, who was named the 2019 Runner of the Year by the club, joined in 1982 and is still keeping the pace. He can't begin to calculate the miles he has run, but credits the club for keeping him at it.

"They are so supportive of one another and interesting people too. We have coffee after our runs so really have become great friends. Many of us have traveled together to run all over the world."

In 1987 Laurie Reich joined the group as a way to train for climbing Mount Kilimanjaro. For many years, she did the early morning run before she went to work.

# Residents Would Likely Back Sales Tax Increase, Survey Finds

survey of a sampling of Orinda voters A found support for a one-cent, generalpurpose sales tax increase but a "a half-cent sales tax has stronger and broader support compared with a full cent," according to a city report.

Conducted Jan. 31 to Feb. 6, the survey reached 436 residents, or 3 percent of registered voters who are "likely to participate in the November 2020 election." As of Feb. 10, 2019, Orinda had 14,020 registered voters, nearly 50-percent of whom are

Participants were asked to give opinions on the increased sales tax, wildfire prevention, emergency response, road repairs and other topics.

The City Council had planned to discuss the survey on March 17 but the meeting was postponed until at least April over health [SEE TAX page 16]

# Council Expected to Set ADU Rules

The City Council could soon make some **■** binding decisions on the hot-button issue of granny units after receiving the Planning Commission's recommendations in March.

Before the coronavirus outbreak, the city had set a public hearing on accessory

dwelling units (ADUs) for April 7, with the council preparing to adopt rules.

Last year, a detached unit could be built to a maximum 1,200 square feet and up to 27 feet high subject to existing setback zones. At the March 3 City Council meeting, residents voiced concerns about establishing smaller units, requiring discretionary review for larger units and not [SEE ADU page 14]

# Miramonte Boosters 2020 Hall of Fame Inductees

The Miramonte Boosters Club will induct Steve Harwood, Garth Haynes, Brett Jackson, Bill Maze, Megan Reid, Heather White and Paul Yriberri (posthumously) into the 2020 Athletic Hall of Fame at a ceremony in October.

Steve Harwood is well-known as the "Voice of the Matadors" for sports events and banquets spanning the past three decades. He currently announces Mats boys' and girls' basketball and baseball games. Harwood served as president of the Miramonte Boosters Club and has made significant financial contributions to Miramonte sports including a new speaker system for the baseball field. Previously, he has received both Orinda Citizen and Volunteer of the Year honors.

Garth Haynes, '76, was the star of the 1975-1976 FAL basketball championship team and ranks in the top 10 in Miramonte single season scoring and rebounding. Nationally, he was in the top 50 tennis singles players and won the NCS Singles Championship in 1976. He competed globally from 1981-1984 and coached tennis at Pepperdine and the College of San Mateo. Haynes continues to compete in US Tennis Association (USTA) events.

Brett Jackson, '06, is considered one of Miramonte's all-time baseball greats. He was a first-team All-DFAL selection twice, the 2005 All-CIF shortstop and played on

North Coast Section title teams. He won several awards playing for Cal Berkeley in what was then the Pac-10. Jackson was named Baseball America First Team All American, played for Team USA at the 2009 Pan Am Games. Professionally, he played for the Cubs, Diamondbacks and Giants before retiring in 2015.

William Maze, '74, played varsity basketball and was ranked the top 16-year-old tennis player in the country. He won the 1973 North Coast Section Singles Championship, was a three-time All-American at Stanford and played doubles with John McEnroe. Maze played on a professional tennis tour and competed in four Grand Slam tournaments. He is in the NorCal Tennis Hall of Fame and has been the UC Davis women's tennis teams head coach for 25 years.

Megan Reid, '14, was an all-league player in varsity soccer, water polo, basketball and track. She was named the Diablo Foothill League Soccer Player of the Year in 2011 and 2014, played on the Lamorinda club soccer team and was selected MVP of the Denmark Cup. Recruited by Division 1 schools for both basketball and soccer, she decided to focus on one sport, playing soccer at the University of Virginia.

Heather White, '06, holds multiple Matador swimming records. She was the North Coast Section 200 Individual Medley Champion from 2004-2006 and was the *Contra Costa Times* 2006 Swimmer of

the Year. White became an All-American swimmer at UC Berkeley and is ranked in the top 10 on Cal's all-time performance charts in both the 200 and 400 IMs and the 200 Backstroke. She competed at the 2008 US Olympic Swimming Trials.

Paul Yriberri, '66, lettered in and coached football, wrestling and baseball at Miramonte. He coached junior varsity football, was a varsity defensive coordinator and helped the Matadors win seven league football titles and three North Coast Section 2A titles. Yriberri taught physiology and biology and is the first to be inducted as a coach and athlete. He died suddenly in 2007. The football field was renamed Paul Yriberri Field in 2018.

The Miramonte High School Boosters Club donates funds to supply team equipment for sports, pay salaries for support personnel, weight-room supplies and

# Second Annual Trail Challenge Set

Pollowing last year's successful event, Lafayette, Moraga and Orinda Parks and Rec directors look forward to seeing even more local residents discover the plethora of trails in the area during the Second Annual Lamorinda Trail Challenge.

The free, self-guided program allows participants to complete the challenge by one of two ways: Go the Distance or Complete the Objectives.

Go the Distance participants track the distance they hike on Lamorinda trails and submit a log showing a completed total of 26.2 miles. Those choosing the objective approach must complete five of eight objec-

tives listed in the guide. Objectives include identifying native wildflowers, pitching in to clean up trash along trails, hiking to a creek or just having a picnic.

A kick-off party is currently planned for 11 a.m. May 2 at Orinda Library Plaza, 26 Orinda Way. Ian Baird, president of the Orinda Hiking Club, is scheduled to discuss the benefits of regular nature hikes.

Maps and guidebooks will be available at the kick-off party. If, due to COVID-19 restrictions, the kick-off party is canceled, participants can download the maps and guidebooks at www.lovelafayette.org/trails, www.moragarec.com or www.cityoforinda. org.



# Seniors Around Town Founder Wiley Receives Local Jefferson Award

The founder of Orinda's innovative **■** program that connects volunteer drivers with senior citizens who need rides is the latest recipient of a prestigious award.

Kate Wiley, who started Seniors Around Town (SAT) 15 years ago with a state transportation grant, won April's local Jefferson Award sponsored by the television station KPIX. She will be among 30 to 50 Bay Area recipients who will be featured on the television station and receive medals at a ceremony in January. Wiley joins fellow Orinda residents Pam and Gary Schroeder who received the award in March.

In fact, it was Pam Schroeder who nominated Wiley for the award, noting in the nomination form, "Her commitment to the program and the needs of the seniors shines through with her positive and gracious attitude."

Schroeder pointed out how during last

year's power outages Wiley "went well beyond expectations to visit elderly riders to check in on them. Kate visited one woman, living alone in her dark, cold house without a phone, and was the woman's only visitor for two days."

SAT connects senior citizens with volunteers who drive them to medical and personal appointments. While the appointments may be out of town, the program prides itself on the fact that those receiving and providing the service are Orinda residents. This, Wiley said, has been the secret to success and creates long-lasting

The program started in 2005 with 25 rides and, last year, provided 1,421. Currently, the program averages 115 rides a month with 120 registered riders and 70 active drivers. Now funded by the Orinda Association, SAT runs on an annual \$35,000 budget and has three part-time employees.

Wiley said she hopes the recognition will help encourage more people to sign

up as volunteer drivers because demand for the service continues to increase as does its scope.

"It's an excellent opportunity to get the word out, not only in our community, but to the broader community showing how they can set up their own program like this," said Wiley, who has lived In Orinda since 1985 with her husband Rich Wiley. "It's a reminder to anyone who wants to give directly back that they can."

During the power outages Wiley said she realized senior citizens were particularly vulnerable. As a result, SAT worked with local safety agencies to develop the Volunteer Emergency Support Program (VESP) to have volunteers check on and assist seniors during emergencies. Volunteers would get groceries and pick up prescriptions for home-bound seniors living alone, for example. It turned out to be a fortuitous decision, with volunteers doing exactly that following the coronavirus outbreak.

"We learned it is important to have an accurate database of our riders, where they live, their circumstances, and map them out so police and fire have an up-to-theminute current database of who they need to help," Wiley said. "Because we have such an in-depth relationship with our drivers, we can identify who to call and ask if they are interested in being part of VESP."

The SAT crew plans to use geographic mapping to connect seniors with volunteers who live nearby as well.

"We have to crank it up because fire season will be here soon. We're very aware that we've only got about five or six months to really get this going," Wiley said.

some connections," Goshorn said.

Goshorn said the mood among clients was generally positive and appreciative. "We see the need, and know we are only able to do this because of our volunteers and their willingness to jump in," she said.

Like the rest of the Bay Area, Orinda became a virtual ghost town with activities coming to a halt.

The Orinda Association and the Orinda Community Foundation postponed the Citizen of the Year and the William Penn Mott Jr. Environmental Award dinner scheduled for March 22. A new date has not been set but organizers are considering sometime later this year.

The same was true for the Annual Wildlife and Olive Festival that had been planned for April 18.

"The well-being of everyone in our community is of paramount importance, and we will reschedule the festival as soon as we are able to," posted Friends of Wagner Ranch Nature Area on their web site.

The Three-Quarter Century Club canceled its May 20 event.

At first, in response to a call for social distancing, the Orinda Theatre reduced by 50 percent the number of tickets that would be sold to allow for an empty seat between patrons. But following the shelter in place recommendation, theatre officials decided to close until at least April 7.

The theatre also postponed its March

15 Live at the Orinda performance of Natalie Douglas as well as Chris Mann's performance on April 5, promising to honor tickets when concerts are rescheduled.

# Volunteers Needed to Collect Leaves

Talling all volunteer nature sleuths: The first weekend in May is your opportunity to collect and record locations of symptomatic bay leaves for the East Bay Sudden Oak Death Blitz.

Volunteers attend a one-hour training and collection materials distribution session 10 a.m. May 2 in the Gallery Room at the Orinda Library. Email Bill Hudson at wllhh2@ymail.com to confirm training is happening. They then collect bay leaves during the weekend, as time allows, and record the detailed GPS location of each

sampled tree. Collected specimens will be analyzed at a lab in Berkeley.

Sudden Oak Death, a serious and exotic disease, is threatening the survival of tanoak and several other oak species in California. Timely detection of the pathogen Phytophthora ramorum, often found on bay leaves and generally precedes oak infections, is key for a successful, proactive attempt to slow down the SOD





# Galleries Closed for Now, New Exhibitions Waiting in the Wings

The Art Gallery at the Orinda Library will be closed through April 7. If the Bay Area's shelter in place is lifted, the April exhibit will be installed on or near that date.

The artist reception has been rescheduled for 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. April 26 if restrictions are lifted. For up-to-date information on gallery exhibits go to https://lamorindaarts.org/current-exhibits/.

At the Wilder gallery, the current exhibit of Joel Tesch's paintings will remain in place through the end of the month. No artist reception is scheduled in April.

The work of John Anderle, which was scheduled for April at Wilder, has been rescheduled for August.

The library gallery, once it reopens, is set to display "Out of Africa" photographs by Maggie Boscoe, David Fleisig, Pam Hall, Jeff Halliday and Maureen Rosati-Wee, along with the Bay Area Studio Artists group show entitled "Inspired By."

Boscoe, Orinda resident and Lamorinda Arts Council co-curator of the library gallery, organized the exhibit. She said so many people told her Africa was their favorite place to visit that she had to find out why. All group members agree with Hemingway who said, "I never knew of a morning in Africa when I woke up that I was not happy."

Each member of the group has been on different trips to Africa at different times. Most of the five-member group's 72 photographs – all 8" x 10" in matte finish – portray exotic birds and animals with a few portraits and landscapes.

*I Am Woman, Hear Me Roar* recalls an unforgettable moment while Boscoe was on safari. "I've used a bit of whimsy in my titles," she said.

Fleisig of Berkeley said, "I've been on three African safaris. I was and still am fascinated by being off road and seeing wonderful wildlife in its natural environment." Fleisig's *Serengeti Cheetah* was shot within the Serengeti National Park, a vast savanna spanning 12,000 square miles.

Halliday of Orinda is fascinated by the birds of Africa. When you view his *African Darter* photograph portraying this water bird's 47 inch wingspan you'll understand why. It is also dubbed "snakebird" (*slanghals* in Afrikaans) because it typically swims underwater with only its neck and head sticking out. This gives the bird the appearance of a swimming snake. It frequents fresh and brackish waters close to fresh vegetation in sub-Saharan Africa and Iraq.

Rosati-Wee of Orinda said she dreamed for many years of visiting Botswana because the country has done such a wonderful job preserving its wildlife. She also wanted to see and photograph the colorful landscape in different areas of Namibia. Her *Botswana Leopard* photograph is an up-close and personal look at this solitary, stealthy and shy animal. "When I finally went, I was so taken aback with the beauty of Africa and its people that I returned a second time to share this beautiful continent with my entire family," said Rosati-Wee.

Bay Area Studio Artists (BASA) is a group of painters who have been showing work and painting together since 2010. They work in an eclectic mix of subject matter ranging from figurative to landscapes, from realism to expressionism. Boring is not in their vocabulary.

Their theme for this show, "Inspired By" is meant to reflect the inspirational forces in the lives of each artist. This includes great cooks, nature's wonders, fighters for freedom, the beauty of a garden, love of [See GALLERIES page 12]



Talling in love with a 1966 Mustang as a 5-year-old, watching in amazement as a 1957 Ford Fairlane 500 Skyliner retracted its hard top into the back of the vehicle, cruising down Richmond's main street in a '57 T-bird, these are a few of John Vanek's favorite things.

"Classic cars have always fascinated me," said Vanek. "My brother Dave and I worked on cars together, and by 15, I worked in a shop fixing them. When Dave started racing, I became a member of his race team. As a 16-year-old, it was all pretty exciting."

Vanek followed his brother to the Z Doctor, a popular repair shop at the time, and worked there for 25 years until the business closed in 2004. Looking for a new position, Vanek applied at Orinda Motors (OM). That was 15 years ago. Since then he has turned what he loves to do – fix classic cars – into a popular component of Orinda Motors.

"When I began at Orinda Motors in 2004, we didn't work on classic cars. But I spoke with our owner Allen Pennebaker about including them," Vanek said. "He had me and mechanic Greg Sisk, who both loved these cars and knew how to fix them, so Allen agreed to give it a go."

# Creative Writers in Search of Expression Publish Student Magazine

Writer's Mag, a creative writing club at Miramonte High School, is gearing up for the second annual publication of its creative writing magazine celebrating art and writing submissions from the student body.

The club was co-founded by juniors Chaya Tong and Scarlett Mosher. The two met during their sophomore year and quickly found they both shared a passion for creative writing – an art that is not taught within the standard English curriculum. Undaunted, the pair collaborated with English teacher Donia Gousios to create "a place for creative writers at Miramonte."

Since its founding, the club has grown to accommodate about a dozen aspiring young writers. During the first semester of the year, the group works together on a variety of writing prompts and invites guest speakers during lunches.

Following the winter finals, the focus of the club shifts from creative writing to a more editorial aspect. Before publication, the club has to apply for grants, find sponsorships, and sell ad space to raise funds.

This year, *Writer's Mag* raised upwards of \$2,000. Tong says the philosophy behind this fundraising is to keep the publication accessible. "We distribute the magazine for free; after all, art should be free and something everyone can enjoy. The pamphlet is

placed in the wellness center and library, and we send a copy to all of our sponsors."

During the submission period, Miramonte students can provide both art and poetry, along with prose works of 250 words or less. Each selected work is paired with an art piece in the final product; an 18-sheet pamphlet printed on magazine paper in full color.

Submissions for the 2020 publication closed Feb. 7. The club worked with San-Leandro printer 404 Creates to publish the final product which will be available this month after the spring break.

"I love creative writing because it gives me the opportunity to express myself," said Tong. "I've loved drawing, theater, writing, music; all these give me an outlet to express myself that I can't get through other mediums like sports."

Tong and Mosher plan to enlarge the club to accommodate more freshman and sophomores. In addition, they are considering inviting guest speakers to the theater and starting a blog to publish Miramonte students' work year-round.

"We really want to make sure the magazine stays continuous after we leave," said Mosher. "Creative writing and poetry has been my passion since fifth grade, and *Writer's Mag* provides a valuable space for young writers that should be preserved."

Much like the pastoral beauty of our Orinda hills, or when a forgotten lunch is only a frantic text away, I think sometimes we get so accustomed to something being there that we forget to step back and appreciate our gifts. Take Pickett for example. Here we have a music and theater teacher

who not only talks the talk in the classroom, but sings the tune, delivers the lines and walks the walk, exactly on cue, in a professional capacity. Often it's an "either/ or" situation, but our community has an educator who commands both.

Unfortunately, the walking of the walk grew almost impossible for him last year. The Archvillain Arthritis entered stage left and overtook our hero. But after a recent hip replacement surgery, Pickett is on the mend and cautiously resuming normal physical activity.

Rehearsals began in January for Shrek Junior, what was this year's spring musical until the coronavirus turned the world upside down. Pickett also teaches a full schedule of vocal music classes and Ensemble Choir at Wagner Ranch and Glorietta, and private voice lessons in his studio. Pickett has won Bay Area acting awards and has starred in numerous local theater productions.

All of this makes him a busy man, with

little down time. Which is why he usually gets right to business when class or rehearsals begin.

Pickett grew up in Walnut Creek, the youngest of three brothers, in the golden days before social media and Broadway Plaza. After graduating from Las Lomas High School, he studied at Diablo Valley College, later transferring to Brigham Young University.

As a student in the Music, Theater and Dance program he earned a place with the university's select musical touring group The Young Ambassadors. This prestigious group performed in India, Sri Lanka, Nepal and across the United States. He earned his teaching credential from Chapman University.

Recalling his college days, Pickett "was supposed to go to New York and become famous." He explained, "A theater dignitary from Shakespeare's Old Globe Theater once visited our class. All the students went around the room individually stating their graduation plans, which all included NYC and Broadway fame."

"When it was my turn, I proudly stated that I planned to become a teacher."

He remembers an audible gasp. Later, he was summoned to the top professor's office to be lectured on his response. This professor had great hopes for his success in New York.

"But what I really wanted was to give back the joy that had been given to me," he said, "I knew I could be a great teacher."

challenging the state with its attempt to rule the city's land use.

Effective Jan. 1, the state set new limits for the size, height and setbacks for ADUs. In advance of the new rules, the City Council adopted an Urgency Ordinance Dec. 19, allowing taller structures with larger setbacks than proposed by the state.

The state allows cities to set the detached building size to a minimum 850 square feet for a one-bedroom unit and 1,000 square feet for a two-bedroom unit. The lowest maximum height is 16-feet for all units and requires cities to allow ADUs within 4 feet of side and rear property lines.

Orinda's urgency ordinance adopted identical size allowances but allowed for taller units – 27 feet if the building meets the 10/15-foot side and 15-foot rear setbacks. A structure built between the city and state setbacks is restricted to 16-feet in height.

The Planning Commission recommends a 16-foot height limit for all ADUs.


If the Planning Commission's recommendations are adopted, Orinda homeowners could built a two-bedroom dwelling, with a maximum 1,000 square foot footprint and up to 16-feet high as close as four feet from a side or rear property line.

If the council maintains the 27-foot height limit, a two-story detached structure with a maximum 1,000 square foot footprint may be built as long as it adheres to the 10- and 15-foot setbacks.

An ADU could also be built atop an attached garage, subject only to the height and size limitations. A 27-foot detached ADU would not be allowed closer to a property line than the stated setbacks.



"It was a high pressure job and being in the out of doors and exercising helped me prepare for it," she said.

Reich's special memories include doing the Kilimanjaro climb with Norm and Janet Pease to celebrate Janet's 50th birthday. Other climbs include Mount Elburs in Russia, Mount Whitney and Mount Shasta. Her travels with club members include walking across England, Morocco and Greece.

Here at home, Reich is now walking with the Saturday group as is her husband, Rudy. He said, "We start out together and sort ourselves out to the speed we are going. In the end, we all regroup at one of our coffee shops in the Lamorinda area. I'm 86 now so this suits me better as I've had to quit my biking career which was how I began with the Road Runners in 1999."

Tom Sturges joined the group in 1984 and admits he doesn't run as far or as fast as before. "In fact many of us older ones are now walking, but we're out there. In the past, I've run 24 marathons. Other Road Runners helped me train for these. Running long distances with them made it much easier."

Kim Overaa said some of her best memories are training for marathons. "You would never think you could run one — and then you could. Training is the key," she said.

"Actually, what got me started with Road

Runners was that I wanted to do a triathlon," Overaa recalls, "I could swim and bike but didn't know how to run. My friend Steve Israel said I could learn with Road Runners, so I joined. Another plus — I met my husband there."

Overaa said the group does more than "just running around Lamorinda" There are lots of parties, member Karen Larsen is starting a book club, and most importantly, she said, they look out for each other. "If someone is sick or has a problem, everyone rallies around to help. It's a close-knit

It was a farm in Iowa where John Fazel began running as a kid. "I'd tell my mother I was going for a run and she would ask, 'How far?' To my answer of around the block she'd then ask, 'Which one, 4 miles or 6?' I ran in high school and college and was running by myself when I moved to Orinda. I'd go around the BART parking lot in a one-mile loop because it was lit at night so I could do it after work. One day I ran around the community park and saw people having a group party to celebrate runners going to the Boston Marathon. I ioined then and there."

Bikers are now included in the mix. Debbie Miller has done the ride to raise money for AIDS 10 times and raised thousands for this cause.

Road Runners have also been involved in a number of local projects. They started the Orinda Trail Council in 1984 and the Orinda Hiking club was an offshoot of that,

concerns related to the coronavirus.

The survey was conducted to gauge voter interest in a potential sales tax ballot measure. In 2012, Orindans voted to increase their sales tax by half a percent – to 8.75 percent – until 2022. In November voters could be asked to extend that increase, let it expire or increase it to a full cent.

The increase would provide \$2.4 million annually to the city's coffers.

According to the language used in the survey, the additional funds are slated to help maintain essential city services, including:

- •Ongoing repairs/ maintenance to public roads and storm drains;
- •Restoring wildlife habitat and recreation along San Pablo Creek, and:
- •Emergency/natural disaster preparedness, including wildfire prevention/ evacuation planning.

Democrats, voters between the ages of 18-54 and those with annual incomes of

more than \$250,000 are more likely to support the measure, the survey concluded.

Among the reasons people gave for supporting the tax ranged from, "Infrastructure needs repairing/needs to be maintained" at 45 percent to the "city needs the money," at 2 percent.

Those who opposed the tax noted "Taxes already high/been paying too much," at 54 percent to "It will hurt local businesses/ people will shop elsewhere" at 1 percent.

Orinda's 8.75 percent sales tax compares to Lafayette's 8.25 percent and Moraga's 9.25 percent. Based on \$10,000 spent annually for durable goods, the tax difference between the cities ranges from \$825 to \$925

Voters could also decide whether an approved sales tax should include a sunset clause after 10 years.
