City Council Denies Appeals on Approved Downtown Development

A standing room only crowd greeted City Councilmembers as they entered the Library Auditorium for the June 6 City Council meeting. While many spoke about

Orinda becoming a Sanctuary City during the Public Forum, a large number spoke on Planning Commission actions regarding 25 Orinda Way, located directly across from the Orinda Library.

Approved by the Planning Commission on Mar. 22, the development at 25 Orinda Way consists of a two-story building with ground floor retail and restaurant uses and a second story for office uses. On Dec. 12, the commission approved a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) allowing two ground-level automated teller machines (ATMs) within the central courtyard facing Orinda Way. The site had formerly been used by several different gas stations. The last one closed in 1998. Leaking underground storage tanks necessitated a long decontamination process completed in late 2013.

In Forma Fitness Appeal

The first appeal, brought by Andrea Columbu, owner of In Forma Fitness, asked the council to reverse the Planning Commission's decision allowing Orange Theory Fitness to occupy 3,000 square feet on the ground floor of 25 Orinda Way. Columbu

appealed the decision based on the project not being consistent with the Orinda General Plan, not meeting required findings and standards for CUPs and adversely impacting his business located at 23A Orinda Way.

Many people spoke in support of Columbu and what this additional fitness facility would do to his business while an equal number spoke about the differences between the two and how they appealed to different demographics.

"Orange Fitness targets 35-45 year olds and differs from traditional fitness and gym centers because it only offers group classes rather than individual use," said Paul Ugenti, owner of 25 Orinda Way.



At the Orinda Library Gallery during the month of July, the Lamorinda Arts Council invites you to spend a summer afternoon viewing portraits and drawings of the human figure done by local artists, as well as Laura Sutton's beloved California landscapes, Doug Crooks' woodworking, and metal art by Dan Bertolini. You can meet the artists at their reception on July 8 from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. when light refreshments will be served.

About 20 members of two longtime workshops at the Orinda Community Center – the Portrait Drawing and Figure Painting and Drawing workshops – are exhibiting 40 works. They draw and paint in a variety of styles, always from living models. Each artist interprets the posing figure to produce their impression of the scene.

Participants return to the workshops year

after year because drawing from life calls for total engagement of the artist's awareness in order to faithfully represent what is observed. During these workshops, the world drops away, creating an atmosphere that is at once challenging and fulfilling. Look for *Marija* by Ellen Bulf, a 16" x 20" watercolor portrait and watch it come to life right before your eyes. Jane Raymond's *Pigeon*, a 12" x 16" oil on canvas portrait, breathes as you look at it. Tom Simm's *Leotard Attitude*, a 12" x 18" pastel, strikes a dancer's pose. 



Support Changes Downtown

The Orinda City Council will soon hold public hearings to review input from the ULI (Urban Land Institute) over proposals for improvements to Orinda's downtown. Suggestions will include possible zoning changes that could increase heights of building and provide for up to 240 housing units. There have been several letters sent in opposing any such changes. Most of these decry that these changes will destroy our village character, lead to traffic congestion and undermine the quality of our schools if we provide affordable housing. Don't count me in as one of these naysayers.

As an aging community and to provide housing for our teachers and others that support our public services as well as young professionals, we need well designed alternative housing that is close to downtown and BART. As older members of our community look for alternative housing, they must find a home in Rossmoor rather than an opportunity in their own back yard. Well located housing and new commercial space in our downtown means a five-minute walk to BART as well as new commercial space to attract and support local businesses.

As to the issue over height, we now have a maximum height of 35'. If that goes up to 55' in select locations, it would be comparable to building heights similar to several existing buildings in our downtown including the Vintage House and the new senior housing project (Monteverde) across from the fire station. These are well designed and well suited for their sites and any proposed project would use the same careful design considerations to make sure that the projects respect our village character and blend into the surrounding one- and two-story setting.

Just by allowing for more height and density does not lead to an overhaul of our downtown since many properties could not meet parking and setbacks to maximize their footprint. A look around at our existing downtown, which allows 35', is mostly one to two stories and not three stories which current zoning allows. Stepped back heights will provide a nice transition from one story to several stories with little visual impact.

Hopefully, our City Council will support changes that may stimulate upgrades to many of our commercial properties, many of which are unattractive and offer poor commercial space. New projects can add new housing opportunities in our downtown to support the needs of our old and new residents.

Why not allow Community Choice Energy?

At the Orinda City Council meeting on

Tuesday, May 16, nine people spoke during the Public Forum in support of Community Choice Energy (CCE) and requesting that it be put on the agenda for the next council meeting. Additional people were in the audience in support of CCE and approximately two dozen emails were sent and numerous phone calls made to the mayor and city manager in support of CCE.

Councilmember Inga Miller moved to discuss CCE at the next council meeting. In spite of the strong show of public support, no other councilmember would second the motion. The audience was surprised and shocked. There is no direct cost to the city to join a CCE provider. Indirect costs may include legal review of documents, but since Contra Costa County and most of the cities in the county, including Walnut Creek, Lafayette and Moraga have joined, acceptable legal documents already exist. Staff time for approval would similarly be minimal

Joining a CCE provider gives residents a choice of energy sources with more renewable content than PG&E at the same or lower cost. Residents can opt out of the CCE to stay with PG&E. Orinda is disallowing its residents and businesses a choice of energy sources.

Laura Sutton of Lafayette has been painting for several decades. Of the 20 works she is showing, most are oil paintings, some are watercolors, all are landscapes. Doug Crooks of Hercules has been working with wood for over 50 years. He made rocking horses for his four grandchildren using natural wood. The last one he entered in the California State Fair and won first prize. He used 17 different kinds of wood to construct it and only sealed it, using no stain of any kind.

Carving wood keeps his imagination alive, exemplified by the 20-plus works he

is showing. Don't let him near your golf clubs as he likes carving all manner of bird and animal heads, such as frogs and ducks, out of the club heads. He even uses wood carving for his letterboxing hobby to keep things interesting. Who else would carve a shelf into a tree limb or take a 4 x 4 piece of wood and carve a drawer into it? Other creations include walking canes for adults and children and even a xylophone.

Dan Bertolini of Concord is exhibiting a variety of metal artwork. He creates welded metal sculptures using steel, aluminum, brass and copper.

The portrait artists hope that community

supported art encourages viewers to explore art for themselves. Crooks says, "Original arts and crafts are not your everyday thing. They're something unique that could open people's mind to new experiences." Sutton believes that, "Art draws us into our right mind, where individuality is more comfortable. It inspires us to communicate."

CAR FIME

Are We Ready To Hit the Road?

Summer time is here, and it is time to make vacation plans. If we plan on taking the trusty family hauler, we need to make sure it is ready for the road and prepared for all situations. Our goal is to properly maintain the vehicle and avoid unwanted problems. Cars, however, are machines and, despite our best efforts, they can break down.

Before you take off, be sure to have a pretrip inspection. Please, please do not wait until the day before your trip to do this. Your vehicle may need attention that you were not aware of. A short time frame will only add unwanted stress to you and your car care provider. I recommend scheduling this pre-trip ritual about one week before leaving. When you travel, you will most likely be faced with higher elevations and higher temperatures that can accelerate battery failure. For instance, a battery may operate fine in Orinda but fail in consistent temps over one hundred degrees while in Tahoe. A simple battery load test will confirm the battery's condition.

The next tip is to make sure you are ready for a breakdown. Do you have a road service plan such as AAA? Do you know who to call in case you get stuck on the road? These are questions that must be answered before you drive the car anywhere. A common failure is a flat tire. Do you know where the spare tire and jack are located? Do you know the condition of the spare tire? I purchased a Ford Explorer and found out that the jack and tools were completely missing!

What if you have a flat tire? You should safely pull over. Your car's handling will drastically change if you have a flat. Do not apply heavy brakes or make quick steering movements. Carefully steer your car off the roadway and apply the brakes smoothly. It is important not to drive a car too long on a flat tire, because it could damage the wheel.

What to do if your car breaks down? The first thing to keep in mind is safety. Look for a safe place to pull over. Now is the time to put your "breakdown plan" into motion. If your temperature gauge is reading high or overheating, you must immediately pull over. Some cars have a light instead of a gauge. If you continue to drive a car that is overheating, you will cause damage to your engine. There is no good reason to open the hood at this point. You should not touch anything under the hood for at least an hour.

There is never a good time to have a breakdown but having a plan in place will help. Of course, you can avoid these situations altogether by preparing your vehicle and yourself before hitting the road.

Annual Car Show Expands Offerings at Local Automotive Business



The 13th Annual Orinda Classic Car Show returns on September 9, and its impact over the years has changed how Orinda Motors operates. "Our expertise and our love of cars combined with the popularity of these classic cars has caused us to outgrow our shop," maintains Orinda Motors Service Manager John Vanek. "We realized that we had a lot of classic cars to work on and that we needed to bring on another tech to focus on the classic cars. We have two full-time guys and a full shop now."

The Orinda Classic Car Show was born 13 years ago when Vanek had a photo shoot with *Drive Magazine*: "I got some customers' cars, we took pictures and one of my customers, Chip Herman, had his car here. He said, 'This looks like a car show.' About a week later, Chip came back and said, 'You want to have a car show?' Our humble beginning was with 18 cars, hot dogs and a boombox for a stereo." Last year, the car show had over 200 vehicles.

The growth of the car show and Orinda Motors' classic car business has happened hand-in-hand. "Now, every time we have a car show, we end up with people wanting our services," Vanek says. As a result, Orinda Motors expanded and opened the Orinda Classic Car Center in January. "We combined our offices last May, so the oil change operation and the main operation are in the same place," Vanek notes. "We now have three serious car guys here each with about 30 years of experience."

Even with the expansion, Orinda Motors still services contemporary cars. "We haven't given up on everyday cars. We still focus on customer service and quality repairs," advises Vanek. "It's like two different kinds of car repair shops in one location. Everyday driving cars fix much faster and parts availability is much better. Classic cars are a different game. Parts availability and quality can be a bit of a challenge," he suggests. "We have a Diamond T Truck sitting here. There were only 700 of them made. We were lucky enough to find a guy in Amarillo, Texas, who's got a rear end for [See CARS page 12]



Orinda's Best Hometown Parade Has Something for Everyone

The Orinda Association's hard-working volunteers have been busy for months organizing one of America's Best Hometown Parades ever. Taking place on the 4th of July with a plethora of activities from 7:30 a.m. - 2:30 p.m., there is something

In honor of the 20th anniversary of the Orinda/Tabor Sister City Foundation (OTSCF) and its year-long celebration of everything Czech, The Orinda Association has proclaimed this year's parade as "The Year of the Czechs." The OTSCF is a 501(c) (3) group created to foster a relationship between Orinda and the City of Tabor, in the Czech Republic.

Orinda resident Bobbie Landers, the current chair of the OTSCF, will serve as one of the parade's Grand Marshals, along with former Miramonte High School exchange student Michael Čížek (who is visiting from Tabor), Czech Consular Officer Linda Janourove-Tang and Slavka Ruzicka, Vice Chair of OTSCF, representing the region of Czech Republic where she grew up.

Landers says the parade's Grand Marshals will dress in traditional kroje (Czech folk costumes), and ride atop the Czechthemed parade float singing "a few of our Czech favorites played by the East Bay Banjo Club."

The goal of the U.S Sister City Program, initiated by President Dwight D. Eisenhower in 1956, is to encourage international friendships between people of diverse cultures. In 1987, Landers, along with Orinda's first Mayor Richard Heggie and others, decided to partner with Tabor, a Czech town which was emerging from Communist control.

The foundation has since worked with several Orinda non-profit organizations to sponsor educational activities, provide fellowships for physicians from Tabor, send English as a Second Language teachers to Tabor and sponsor visiting Czech students, who spend a semester at Miramonte High School. According to Landers, the Foundation's goal is to raise awareness while educating the greater San Francisco Bay


Pre-Parade Activities

Coach Vince Dell'Aquila, Well Respected Miramonte Icon, Retires

Retiring Miramonte High School Athletic Director Vince Dell'Aquila didn't go quietly in the last weeks of his tenure as the school year wound down. "Coach Dell," who will continue as an offensive line coach for the Mats' football team next year, will give up his teaching and other coaching duties after a 19-year run as the leader of Miramonte's athletic program "to spend more time with my family and just because it's time."

Feted at a celebratory BBQ lunch on May 20 sponsored by baseball parents, the 63-year old Orinda coaching icon also came within one hit of capping his baseball coaching career with an NCS championship and a perfect 27-0 season when Miramonte dropped a taut 4-3 finale to the Drake Pirates.



Coach Dell'Aquila and his wife Kathie were honored at his retirement celebration on May 20.

Typically seeing things from the perspective of "the kids," Dell'Aquila bemoaned the pressure that was on his charges in the build-up to the June 3 championship game at St. Mary's College: "They wanted to win so badly for themselves, their teammates, their school and community and for me because I was retiring. Still, what they accomplished was amazing."

Miramonte Principal Julie Parks calls Dell'Aquila more than a teacher and coach: "He is a role model who believes that his most important job is raising our kids to be responsible and respectful adults. He leads by example each day, bringing his calm demeanor and kindness to every situation and to every person with whom he meets." Parent Sandra McGonigle echoes Parks' remarks: "Vince has been a beloved and

positive influence on literally thousands of Miramonte students and student athletes over the years." Tim Tague, a graduating senior on the baseball team, who was also Miramonte's football quarterback, adds a student perspective: "He's such a great guy, always so calm, and helpful and has been successful over his career."

Tague was one of the 34 Miramonte student-athletes who played both baseball and football this past school year. This pleased Dell'Aquila, who extols the virtues of students playing multiple sports in high school rather than specializing too early: "Besides everything else, it allows youngsters to develop and rest different muscle groups as well as forming relationships with more people." Dell'Aquila himself enjoyed playing three sports at St. Francis High School in Southern California where he grew up. He continued playing baseball and football at Pasadena Community College and Cal Poly Pomona, for the Broncos under the tutelage of legendary baseball coach John Scolinos, who himself had coached both baseball and football at Pepperdine before embarking on his thirty year career at the helm of Pomona's well-respected baseball

Still, Dell'Aquila cites his father Fred, who had enjoyed a brief stint in the Chicago White Sox minor league system, as his mentor and role model: "He only coached me for one year in Babe Ruth ball, but I always tried to coach the way he coached. He saw coaching as teaching. It was about the approach. Like him, I tried to teach kids like professionals while seeing them as people, as kids, first." With Miramonte's five NCS football championships and six baseball titles since Dell'Aquila became part of the program in 1991, and with a legion of student-athletes who responded to "Coach Dell's" approach and persona, clearly he has been quite successful.

In a sense, Miramonte High School is losing Dell'Aquila because of home runs, doubles and triples. Dell'Aquila looks forward to spending more time at home with Kathie, his wife of 44 years, who herself retired four years ago from Alhambra High School, where she was an associate principal. Most immediately, he also anticipates spending even more time with his son Brian's five-year-old twins and his daughter Julie's six-month old triplets.

Julie, who like Brian and sister Cassandra, graduated from Miramonte, lives in Southern California. Dell'Aquila notes how difficult it's been helping with the prematurely born but thriving triplets and then rushing back to his duties at Miramonte.

The ending of the NCS title game epitomized the rationale for Dell'Aquila to retire: "One of my grandsons greeted me with two questions. He asked, 'Did you win?' and then 'Are you done?' before concluding, 'that's too bad, but at least you'll now be able to spend even more time with us."

Ironically, Dell'Aquila found his home at Miramonte through his son Brian: "I was asked to help coach in 1991 when Brian started at the school and really enjoyed it. Soon after, he gravitated to teaching PE while coaching. He's been a varsity baseball coach for 22 years and an assistant football coach and PE teacher for over 25 years. As an AD, he has overseen numerous successful Miramonte programs in water polo, soccer and basketball, just to name a few.

As athletic director and coach, Dell'Aquila has encountered many Miramonte athletes who have gone on to star collegiately, professionally and in the

Olympics. In football, that list includes Miramonte Hall of Famers Drew Bennett and Ken Dorsey. In addition, "Coach Dell" has coached many former and current NFL linemen, including Mike Gibson and Patrick McCoy (Eagles) and Cameron Fleming (Patriots), as they have positioned themselves for the NFL draft.

"I've always appreciated all the support of the Miramonte administration and parents," he concludes. "They've provided the best facilities, equipment, traveling and banquets. Most of all, I've been lucky to work with great principals and coaches. If I know I've helped guide the kids I've coached and taught to be better fathers and citizens, I'm happy."





The Land of Oz Comes to Orinda

The Orinda Starlight Village Players (OrSVP) are bringing another original adaptation to the stage starting July 21. *L. Frank Baum's The Wizard of Oz* is Malcolm Cowler's fourth original stage adaptation. Previous adaptations include *Escape to Bedlam* (2013), a collection of three Edgar Allan Poe stories, *Bram Stoker's Dracula* (2014), and *Carlo Collodi's Pinocchio* (2015).

Cowler has been working on this production for two years. "It's very close to the original storyline and has eight original songs included in the production," notes Cowler. "I imported the original text of the whole book into my script editor and then gradually carved it down into a workable play script. This pretty much guarantees that the script contains over 80 percent of the original wording."

Not only has Cowler spent a lot of time on the script, but he is incorporating projector technology to bring the audience into Oz. "I've spent a lot of time creating an entire three-dimensional land of Oz, using role playing gaming software," enthuses Cowler. "The Munchkin, Winkie and Quadling villages, the witches' castle and the Emerald City are all there to travel into and through. The back wall of the stage

is a large projection screen. So a continuous audio/video background will carry the audience into and through Oz as the story unfolds."

"Emily is returning to play Dorothy in this production," says Cowler. The cast, with over 30 performers aged 3 to 85, includes OrSVp regulars Susan Chapple, Bill Chessman, Dan Phillips, Clair Stevenson and Artistic Director Geotty Chapple.

Columbu countered, "In Forma has been in our location for over 22 years. Our customers range from early teens to 80 year-olds with a concentration in the 35-55 age range. We also offer group classes and have an integral training class on the same model as Orange Fitness. Allowing Orange Fitness to move next door impacts not just my family but our loyal customers and instructors."

City Councilmember Inga Miller asked if the two fitness centers located next to each other came under "undue concentration" of similar businesses in the city's municipal code. Planning Director Buckley Drummond said that it did not and that undue concentration does not mean no competition.

Ugenti said he thought both fitness centers could co-exist and survive. He noted that he had approached over 350 retail stores and restaurants trying to get them to commit to his building without much

"Restaurants consider Orinda a risk and other retailers see how Orinda residents go elsewhere to buy products," he said. "They want assurances that if they move to this building that there will be strong anchor tenants that will bring the foot traffic."

Ugenti introduced representatives from Urban Remedy, a local organic food store owned by Whole Foods, and The Coffee Shop, a coffee and fresh food restaurant. Both may open in the new space if Orange Fitness and Chase Bank become anchor tenants.

"We are possibly looking to sign a lease if Orange Fitness is here because we feel we have some alignment with them as far as health and wellness," said Urban Remedy's CEO Paul Coletta. Jeff Ingram from The Coffee Shop added that 35 percent of his customers at the company's Lafayette store are from Orinda.

Several audience members and City Councilmember Darlene Gee expressed concerns regarding the traffic study done by TJKM. The approved development includes 26 parking spaces on the second floor and 42 spaces on the rooftop level. TJKM allotted spaces as follows: 52 (restaurants); 18 (office); 18 (bank) and 15 (fitness). While the allotted 103 spaces exceed the 68 actual parking slots, the study shows how the different businesses only use a portion of their allotted spaces at various times throughout the day with peak hours often varying.

Orinda resident and In Forma supporter John Brown expressed concern about parking and the parking study. "If there are 24

people in a class, they'll need more than 15 spaces," he said.

"The peak hours for the fitness center are not the peak hours for the other tenants," said Chris Kinzel of TJKM, who noted in the study that there would be parking deficits between 10 a.m. and 12 p.m.

The City Council voted 3-2 to deny In Forma's appeal and to allow Orange Theory Fitness to occupy ground floor space at 25 Orinda Way.

Chase Bank Appeal

The second appeal, brought by Paul Ugenti, asked that Chase Bank be allowed a Conditional Use Permit for a 3,000 square foot space on the ground floor at 25 Orinda Way. The bank had previously been approved by the Planning Commission for second floor occupancy with the ground floor ATMs added in December 2016.

Ron Chester of Chase Bank said they had many customers who lived in Orinda and drove to Chase locations in other cities to do their banking: "We have been trying for years to open a branch in Orinda. It will allow us to grow our relationship with our customers and bring additional foot traffic to Orinda."

In 2014, prior to Paul Ugenti's application, Chase Bank had applied for a new structure on the same site. The proposed two-story 4,100 square foot building with parking housed primarily the bank with 1,200 square feet of ground floor general retail. The application was subsequently withdrawn.

As to Ugenti's appeal, City Councilmembers expressed concerns over giving up so much ground floor retail to the bank, especially since they had just approved a fitness facility, which has slight retail sales and would generate miniscule sales tax revenue. Councilmember Miller noted that the bank would also close at 4 p.m. and not be open on Sundays leaving a large ground floor space closed during evening and weekend hours.

Mayor Eve Phillips attempted to persuade her fellow councilmembers to approve the bank's request: "Other banks in town are ground level, and I'm worried that if we don't approve this appeal, this project might not happen."

The City Council denied Chase Bank's appeal with a 4-1 vote.

Of note here is that there are other theaters besides the Lamorinda ones that show their selections (The Jarvis Conservatory in Napa and the El Campanil in Antioch, for example).

Starting on July 8, the Rheem will host the 2017 edition of "Creature's Con." Starting at 12 p.m., the usually quiet neighborhood around the Rheem will be besieged by all manner of Ghostie and Ghoulie as Lord Blood-Ra presides over a day devoted to all that is scary, spooky and altogether unnerving. There will be celebrity guests (John Stanley among them), panels, dealers, artists and, of course, all manner of ghastly showings, shorts, old TV episodes and even some documentaries. The entire event will continue until 10 p.m. Tickets will be \$25 and further information can be had at www.creaturescon.com.

Next, sponsored by Theatre Square and Cine Cuvee, the Orinda Theatre presents a free showing of Titanic, arguably, one of the biggest movies of all time. When Titanic was first released in 1997, no one could have predicted how popular and influential this movie would be. After all, there had already been many other movies made about the tragedy. It was thought that all that could be said about the Titanic had been said, but that was not taking into account the director, already an established talent whose previous works had given him the reputation as a filmmaker who would not let a little thing like technical limitations






