# MOFD Labor Negotiations at Impasse

On June 26, the Moraga Orinda Fire District (MOFD) announced that it had reached an impasse in its negotiations with the United Professional Firefighters of Contra Costa County IAFF Local 1230 for a new Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). The MOU is a binding contract between the district and firefighters' union. The previous MOU expired in January 2010. Since then, MOFD and IAFF Local 1230 have been in negotiations.

MOFD president Fred Weil explained, "We have been advised that as an expired binding contract under California labor law, salary scales, benefit levels, etc., specified in the contract remain unchanged until there is a new contract. As an example of what this means, we have been advised that whatever dollar amount per month was contributed by the district to an employee's health insurance premium at the expiration of the contract remains the same for each month into the future unless and until changed in a new contract."

During these negotiations, MOFD has striven to maintain and continue providing the same level of services to the district's citizens, as well as trying to "address the district's unfunded liabilities caused by the spiraling cost of health and retiree health benefits, to limit health benefit costs, to move future employees to a more sustainable pension benefit formula, and to provide an overall level of compensation that is within the district's financial constraints and budget," according to Weil.

Weil said, "Impasse was declared when our negotiator concluded that no progress could be made in the current negotiations." Vince Wells, President of Local 1230 said, "We were surprised at the notice of impasse. We had no communication about it [See MOFD page 17]

# Facilities Tour Shows How Taxpayers Money is Being Spent

When a school district spends \$93,000,000 on facility upgrades, most taxpayers in that district would probably be happy to find out how it is being spent. On Saturday June 9, 2012, the Acalanes Union High School District Board of Trustees went on a tour of their schools to see for themselves and their constituents how their bond money is being spent on the buildings. Chris Learned, Associate Superintendent - business, Dave Humphries, Director Facilities Construction, and Amy Nichols, Technology Projects Director, led the tour for the school board and Superintendent John Nickerson. Dave Goldsmith, Chair of the Measure E Committee (the committee designated to monitor the construction spending of the bond measure), and this reporter also participated in the tour.

Bond Measure E passed in November of 2008 in the Acalanes District, and construction began in April of 2009. The total renovation time will be six years. Acalanes High School opened in 1941. Las Lomas

was built in 1950, Miramonte in 1955, and Campolindo in 1962. Though numerous upgrades and repairs have been done over the years, all the campuses needed major work to bring them up to date regarding building modernization, equipment in the classrooms and new technology.

At Acalanes High School, one project included tearing apart and rebuilding the art classroom. Dave Humphries describes the room, which has skylights that open and close, as "open and inviting." The room is

spacious, and Humphrey adds, "the kids love it, and it was fun to build." It has a gas-fired kiln and also two pottery kilns in a smaller adjacent room. The main room has an audio/visual computer system that can show videos on the whiteboard.

Six years ago the small gymnasium flooded in heavy rains, and insurance paid for a new floor. For the current renovation, the district replaced the floor and started with significant grading, increased gravel

### Enter CC14's "Another World"

The Orinda Library Gallery is excited to present 35 works from CC14 during August, all created with the collaborative theme, "Another World" in mind. On August 4 from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m., an artist reception will be held where light refreshments will be served.

CC14 was established in 2002 when 14 Contra Costa County artists joined together to produce professional gallery exhibits and support each other creatively through critique, education and camaraderie. Today there are 35 active members, 12 of whom are original members. Membership is by invitation, and volunteers rotate coordinating exhibits and hosting monthly critiques. Randy Stansberry is the 2012 coordinator. Their website, www.cc14.us, is maintained by TaVee.

"Another World" echoes throughout the art world. M.C. Escher used it as the title

for a 1947 woodcut, famous because it is the first time his work focused on his idea of relativity; how one object is seen in relation to another. "Alan Bean: First Artist on Another World" was an exhibit held in 2009 at the Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum. Bean is a former astronaut who flew in the Apollo 12 mission. He is the fourth man to walk on the moon and is now a professional artist. CC14 member Kath Balamuth says the theme "fired our imagination, and was something that everybody wanted to explore. Each of us has a different idea of what 'Another World' means."

Works on display include David Fitzgerald's *Natural Causes*, a 30" x 48" acrylic on panel; Mike Ysahar's *On the Other Side of the Black Hole*, a 36" x 48" oil on canvas; FROgard's *Layering O'Keefe*, a 24" x 30" watercolor and Walter Crew's *Walter's Other World*, a 31" x 43" acrylic collage. #### **Worth Out of Line**

Amy Worth, a member of the Orinda City Council, has opposed a plan to make a Bay Area-wide transportation group -- a group to which she belongs -- more accountable to voters.

Worth is, in addition to being on the Orinda City Council, vice chairperson of the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC), a Bay Area agency involved in transportation planning.

Worth has objected to a bill by State Senator Mark DeSaulnier (D-Concord) to have the California Legislature intervene in MTC's plan to spend \$170 million for new offices in San Francisco. Orinda is in DeSaulnier's senate district.

The \$170 million comes from bridge-toll collections.

Worth told the *Contra Costa Times* (July 4) that DeSaulnier's bill is "an unwarranted intrusion into the local decision-making process."

The members of the MTC are not elected to their positions, making the MTC like the British House of Lords.

MTC members should be elected, not appointed, to their jobs. Without elected representation, MTC should be abolished.

Ms. Worth should stick to her elected position on the Orinda City Council. Her valuable time should be spent on matters

affecting Orinda. Worth should have no conflict of interest. She should resign from the MTC.

# Disagree with Trowbridge's Downtown Assessment

In response to Tom Trowbridge's editorial in the June issue, I would offer the following observations:

1) True, Casa Orinda, Rite Aid, and certainly Phair's (now vacant for some years) have been mostly unimproved; however, in the case of the first two, they offer valuable service/product to the community and generate sales tax revenue. Pressuring owners to make improvement so that their reward will be higher property taxes seems counter-intuitive.

2) Comparisons with Lafayette are not totally valid. Moraga and, to an even greater extent, Rheem's retail are marginal at best and many Moragans shop in Lafayette along with a number of people from Rossmoor and Walnut Creek. Most of the

people who shop in Orinda live here and represent a smaller purchasing number.

3)Theatre Square was heralded as a major revitalization for Orinda yet has seen a number of businesses come and go and, at best, sustains sporadic patronage of many of its businesses. High rents fueled in part by more recently assessed property taxes are probably one cause of businesses' struggling here.

4) The way Orinda is divided by the freeway makes it unlikely shoppers will walk from one side to the other. In addition

to our internal geography, the proximity of Lafayette, Walnut Creek, and Concord will always provide attractive alternatives for shopping.

I fully support local business, but I think we need to be realistic about what we can accomplish given our population. The long repaving/re-striping of Orinda Way showed a lack of concern on the part of the City Council for existing business in Orinda. Let's think of ways to support existing businesses without raising property taxes.

# CAR TIME Proper Car Washing

You've spent plenty of money on the purchase of your car or truck, now the question arises, "How do I take care of it?" Proper washing is one of the most overlooked and misunderstood areas of auto care, and sadly improper washing damages and dulls your vehicle's finish over time.

If you take a second and look at the cars around you in a parking lot, or even at a car show, in the direct sunlight you will notice many of the cars have a scratched surface. These microscopic scratches seem to radiate outward in a "cob-web" effect from a central light source like the reflection of the sun. Many of the swirl marks are the result of improper washing and drying techniques. They are caused when grit is abraded against the paint's surface.

Much has been written on how to properly maintain a vehicle's appearance and while most of the tips in this article certainly aren't new, perhaps they may help you think about things in a different light.

Vehicle enthusiasts range from those who religiously wash or quick detail their vehicles daily, to those who love caring for their vehicle but only get the chance to wash them weekly or bi-weekly. Both categories of enthusiasts cringe at the very thought of taking their car or truck to a car wash, otherwise known as "automatic swirl factories." In this article, we hope to give you some ideas and tips that will help you maintain your vehicles appearance and teach you ways to avoid, or at least minimize creating swirl marks.

Car wash shampoos have come a long way since their introduction to the auto-

motive detailing market. There was a time when we all just grabbed dish soap and went to work, but those days are long gone. Dish soap is designed to eat away grease and food, and while it works great for dishes, we need to keep it in the kitchen! The same attributes that break down the grease on dishes will strip your car wax and dry out your plastic moldings and rubber seals!

Wash mitts can be micro fiber style (both short nap and the longer fuzzy monster looking type), sponges, synthetic and genuine sheepskin. The sheepskin wash mitt is a great choice: They are soft, hold lots of water and car wash shampoo, and they rinse cleanly.

When it comes to swirl free washing, one of the greatest ideas to come along is the two-bucket method of car washing. As the name implies you use two separate buckets to wash your car. One bucket holds the soapy car wash solution and the other holds clear clear rinse water so you can rinse your mitt after each pass over your car. This keeps those dirt particles you just picked up on the surface from going back into the clean car wash solution and being picked up again by the wash mitt. At Orinda Auto Detail, we even go the extra step and use two grit guards in both the soap and rinse bucket to keep all the dirt at the bottom of the bucket.

When you're actually washing the car you always want to go top down. Wash in straight, overlapping lines as opposed to circles and remember to be gentle with the wash mitt on the first pass. This first pass [See CAR TIME page 14]

## Your BEST BET After a Disaster

Imagine the disaster we all know will happen has happened. Will you know what to do? The following will help you stay safe in the event of a disaster.

# <u>How will I get help or know where my help is needed?</u>

Since your cell phone probably will not work and your land line will be overloaded with others reaching their out-of-state contact person, you won't! BEST BET: Texting will be the best possibility because your message will stay in queue until the system has the capacity to send it.

# Will first responders (police and/or fire) be able to reach me?

The Incident Commander (IC) in the local city will prioritize the responses, using their limited resources, according to local, area, and regional needs. But if you can't reach them, they will not be coming. BEST BET: Make sure you are prepared to take care of your family and your neighborhood by organizing a Neighborhood Watch/Emergency Preparedness group and taking Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training.

#### **How will I contact my neighbors?**

If you and your neighbors have FRS (walkie-talkie) radios in working condition and you know how to use them, you will be able to contact your neighbors. This simple piece of emergency equipment should be the back-bone of your neighborhood communication in a major emergency. This can only happen if you make a plan, pick your channel and practice. Many neighborhoods in Lamorinda conduct weekly or monthly FRS radio checks with their neighbors at

a prearranged time. BEST BET: Get your FRS radios and practice.

# How will we reach the city and the outside world?

Many licensed Amateur (Ham) radio operators live in Lamorinda. They have the ability to relay neighborhood status and calls for help to the Emergency Operations Centers. You can become part of this essential emergency preparedness group by passing a license exam, paying a minimal fee and buying a radio. Lamorinda has on-going classes for this exam and study help is available online. The popular radios cost between \$50-100. BEST BET: Make sure you have a least one (preferably two) trained, licensed Hams in your neighborhood. To learn more, call 925-631-6650 or go to the Orinda Amateur Radio group site at www.k6ori.com.

# Who will be listening for my Ham radio message?

Many Ham radio operators in the area will be listening and can relay FRS messages to the Emergency Operation Center. The operations center will be connected to the Hams communication team (officially known as K6ORI). BEST BET: Get your [See DISASTER page 14]

Renowned Bay Area actress René Augesen will make her Cal Shakes debut as Ruth Condomine in the Noël Coward classic Blithe Spirit at California Shakespeare Theater opening August 11. ugust 25 will see the return of NorCal Akids Triathlon to Orinda; this year it will be at Orinda Wilder in the Gateway Valley. The event is classified as a Super Sprint Triathlon where athletes will compete in three categories: swimming, bicycling and running. Joel O'Camb of NorCal Kids Triathlon said, "We cater to the first timer or nearly first time triathlete and adjust distances according to age. We are one of the very few triathlons dedicated to kids; there are only two others that I know of in California."

Athletes from six years to high school age are encouraged to attend and compete. There are six different classes for competitors based on their ages. O'Camb said, "We allow many mechanical aids for participants such as floaties in the swim and training wheels on the bike. We also allow one parent to assist in the six and under category. We'll do just about anything to encourage new triathletes. Our motto is Tri 4 Health."

Orinda resident Alexa Clark has been competing in the triathlon since 2009. "This is going to be my fourth year," said Clark. "I got involved because my dad is a triathlete, and I thought it would be fun. My favorite part is the swimming." Clark doesn't change her routine too much when training for the triathlon. "I already swim and do cross country. I like to work on transitions, get my feet wet, run into the garage, dry my feet off, get on my bike and start to ride," she added. Clark placed second in her category last year, and her advice to anyone entering the triathlon is to "know how to transition. That's where

people lose a lot of time. Know what you're going to do when you get out of the pool or off the bike."

A NorCal Kids' spokesperson has the following recommendations for athletes "Familiarize yourself with the course and the transition area. Visit the site the day prior, if possible. Eat a good meal the night before. It is important to stay hydrated. Drink water prior to your race, but don't overdo. Getting to the event early is really useful — it will calm the nerves, and the children will feel more confident knowing everything is ready. Bring a bike helmet and sunscreen."

In the Democratic Republic of Congo three-year-old Zarkayo has graying hair and a swollen belly, both signs of severe malnourishment. He was brought to a medical center from a village that was being looted. It is unclear whether his parents are still alive.

It is because of true stories like this that Keris Dahlkamp is preparing to swim the length of Lake Tahoe to increase the awareness of the horrific violence occurring in the Congo and the direct connections we as Americans have to the crisis. "Once learning how U.S. foreign policy is engaged in the region and about how many of the products I use daily require minerals which are often illegally mined from the resource rich country, I knew I needed to do something. The swim is something I can do, however small, to help shine a light on this tragic crisis," Dahlkamp explains. Very little of the mining profits reach the country's population of 60 million. The living conditions in the Congo are the worst [SEE SWIMMING page 16]

# Something to Howl About... Animal Tales

Mosquitoes, Ticks, Fleas

The triumvirate of pests that threaten your pets in our geographic area includes the mosquito, the tick, and, of course, the flea.

Fleas will lay eggs in your carpet, your upholstery, your drapes, even in your clothes and will hatch long after an initial infestation. There are many excellent commercial and prescription products available to get rid of fleas and vigilance should be maintained year round. And don't blame flea infestation on your cat or dog – humans can bring them into your home as well!

Ticks are, in my opinion, a notch higher on the danger scale. They can cause serious infection if left on the body and are vectors for Lyme Disease and Rocky Mountain Fever, both of which are debilitating to humans. Ticks are actually arachnids, related to spiders and scorpions. They are more visible to the human eye than the flea and, while the flea is an accomplished jumper, the tick is only able to crawl. Typical infestation comes from walking in brush, grass, and shrubbery.

The best way to deal with fleas and ticks is to check your pet's body thoroughly after it has been outdoors. I recommend starting at your pet's tail and working your thumbs and fingers against the flat of the coat. Especially with ticks, you need to

be able to touch and examine your pet's skin. Turn this into massage time for your pet and make it a habit that it will be a fun activity for the both of you. Don't forget to check areas around the eyes and muzzle. Follow this up by combing the coat with a fine tooth comb.

If a tick has become imbedded it will appear to be a bump on the skin and the coloration may be almost flesh colored. This is because the tick is infused with your pet's blood. You must remove the entire tick, including the head, in order to safeguard your pet. Use tweezers to grasp the body mass and then slowly and firmly pull the tick out. There are handy tick removers available at quality pet stores that are an inexpensive and worthwhile investment. Once the tick is removed, swab the bite area with rubbing alcohol. Flush the tick down the toilet and, in fact, I recommend a double flush! A pet who seems lethargic following a tick bite should be taken to a veterinary for examination and possible administration of antibiotics.

And, now, for the worst of the three: the mosquito carrying heartworm larvae. The details of heartworm infestation are both disgusting and deadly. Following a bite by a carrier mosquito, the heartworm [See HOWL page 17]



# Local Publisher Inspired to Write Book on Americana

Robert Etheredge has lived in the Orinda community for over 20 years. He founded MiraVista Press over 10 years ago to publish *Poetry for a Lifetime* edited by his father, Samuel Etheredge. The book proved very successful with its beautiful illustrations and poetry organized by themes. Robert went on to publish several other books including *The Camper's Companion*, a compilation of famous poems, short stories, and helpful tips for the outdoors and complete star maps.

But it wasn't until Robert saw a study showing that almost half of the people in the United States could not pass the U.S. Citizenship Test that he decided a book detailing how America is run and what the rights and responsibilities of her citizens are was needed. The result is *The American Challenge*, a book that provides an easily accessible format allowing the reader to quickly find out about various governmental institutions and American customs and culture.

On his website, www.newamericanchallenge.com, Robert writes, "Thirty-eight percent of Americans given a Newsweek Citizenship Test failed, most being unable to define the Bill of Rights. More than half failed an Intercollegiate Studies Institute civics test. Most couldn't even name all three branches of government. Elected officials taking the test did even worse – their average score was only 44 percent. Failures were evenly split among Republicans and Democrats, conservatives

and liberals. This is a wake-up call for all Americans."

Robert, who served in the Navy from 1972-75, felt inspired to improve his fellow countryman's knowledge. He has spent the past two years researching American history as he worked on *The American Challenge*. "The more civic knowledge citizens possess, the more they participate in their government," he says. Robert also discovered he had some of his own misconceptions. "While researching our American heroes, I discovered they were not necessarily well-known political figures. I was surprised to find out how diverse our heroes really were and how many were everyday ordinary people that changed history forever."





will pick up the majority of the dirt and loosens the remaining dirt for pick up on the second pass.

When you dry your car, use only high quality micro fiber waffle weave drying towels and wring out often. Gently dry the surface without much pressure. You don't need to rub the surface...you're just picking up the bulk of the water! Once you have picked up the bulk of the water, and the first towel is saturated, use the second towel to lightly pick up any remaining streaks or droplets.



a portion of the proceeds to a different children's charity each month. The featured cupcake, a rich and intense chocolate concoction featuring chocolate ganache, creamy chocolate buttercream and chocolate sprinkles, is named in honor of owner Peter McNiff's special-needs son - and hero. Since opening in December, 2009, Republic of Cake has sold nearly 29,000 of Sam's eponymous cupcake and has donated \$16,000 to more than 20 children's organizations.

July's charity was Katie's Clinic at Children's Hospital Oakland, a suggestion from customer Dr. Mary Jones of East Bay Pediatric, and medical director of the Clinic. Katie's Clinic, named for local Rett patient Katie Nues, is one of very few places in the U.S. specializing in the diagnosis and comprehensive care of individuals with Rett syndrome, a genetic disorder of the developing nervous system that causes a baby who is normal at birth to lose hand use, mobility, and purposeful speech toward the end of the first year of life. Rett Syndrome affects 1/10,000 females, affects all races and ethnicities, and is very often misdiagnosed. More than 5,000 girls and women have been diagnosed in the U.S. The gene responsible for causing the disorder was discovered in 1999, and research has since proceeded at a rapid pace leading toward hope for a cure in the not so distant future.

Once per month at Katie's Clinic, a multidisciplinary team of neurologists, pediatricians, physical therapists, music therapists, nutritionists and augmentive communication specialists gather to see patients with Rett syndrome. The team works together to help families create a plan of care that emphasizes the communication abilities and strengths of the patients, who come mostly from Northern California, but also from other states and even the Philippines.

"Therapies that support the needs of those affected are the main treatment," says Dr. Jones, who adds that patients receiving therapies are definitely benefiting: "The multi-specialty approach to care is helpful since this rare disorder affects so many body systems and is complicated to treat. The research on this gene is sometimes referred to as the Rosetta Stone for understanding the genetics of autism and related disorders."

Jones, who follows two Rett syndrome patients at East Bay Pediatric, says that the most important thing she has learned from her experience in working at the clinic is that the abilities of the children are underestimated. "Affected individuals are able to communicate in many different ways and it is easy to miss their interactions," says Jones. "We are excited to explore ways to support this communication and to promote awareness of this rare disorder among physicians and educators. Early diagnosis is very important so therapies can be started."

Republic of Cake's McNiff goes beyond the monetary donation. He takes a personal interest in the various children's charities he supports. He has visited the Katie's Clinic site and spent time communicating and sharing his cupcakes with the girls and staff. "Peter is an amazing friend of Katie's Clinic and of Children's Hospital Oakland," says Dr. Jones. "We are fortunate to have community."

McNiff returns the compliment; "Mary Jones has really drummed up support for Katie's Clinic and Children's Hospital. She's fantastic."

in the world according to the most recent index of Human Development. However, there seems to be a deeply troubling international silence about the plight of the people there, leaving most of us uniformed. "As a husband, father, son and brother, it is hard for me to imagine how families cope in this nation where an estimated six million people have died from war related causes since 1995, with the number growing. It is described by the United Nations as 'the deadliest conflict since WWII," he adds.

This 36-year-old Canyon resident and Lafayette-Orinda Presbyterian Church (LOPC) member plans to begin his 22-mile swim at 3 a.m. on August 11, estimating it will take him 14 hours. He has already swum the 12-mile width. To prepare for this test he is swimming six days a week at the YMCA in Pleasant Hill and is doing a number of long, open water swims at Del Valle Reservoir and Lake Tahoe. Dahlkamp is looking for other swimmers to join him, even if just for half an hour. "I believe the more people involved, the more the message of the situation in the Congo will be spread," he says. He is also looking for donations for the swim, which will go to support The Congo Connect Youth Initiative Project. "You may go on line at www.friendsofthecongo.org/ support-fotc-projects.html, or mail donations to Friends of the Congo, 1629 K St. NW, Suite 300, Washington, DC 20006. In this program, young people from across the Congo heal and promote peace by working in radio stations and on filming projects, to capture and communicate what is happening in the area," Dahlkamp says.

Dahlkamp says it was watching the 27-minute film Crisis in the Congo: Uncovering the Truth that made him want to do something to bring this crisis to the attention of others. He urges everyone to watch it at www.congojustice.org or on YouTube to get some idea of the tragedy there. He also hopes others will sign a petition to request the U.S. government change the manner in which it is engaged in the Congo so strong institutions and the goal of peace are supported. You may do this by clicking on www.change.org/petitions/ secretary-of-state-hillary-clinton-help-endthe-conflict-in-the-congo.

There was a huge turnout of members of the LOPC, to which Keris and his wife Rena belong, when the video was shown there. A Congo team has been formed seeking ways to inform themselves and others and to take appropriate actions to address the needs of the Congolese people.

due to a high water table, and a drain system with sump pump to avoid future water problems.

At Las Lomas High School, the district removed the old tennis court which was sitting directly on sandstone and added sufficient base rock so there will be no water under the court. Humphries says the court's floor life is 20 to 25 years, and "we have a high traffic index of people using it." The district renovated the Culinary Arts classroom to be completely modern. Humphries says, "We created an actual cooking setting, and this is what a chef would see at work." There are seven sections (classes) of culinary arts presently there. Some of the students go on after graduating to the Diablo Valley College Culinary Arts program. Additional work includes new roofs over re-done hallways from the auto shop to the cafeteria with white coating on top to better control heating and cooling and new siding with epoxy paint to replace old wood on some of the buildings.

The Del Valle Educational Center near the entrance to Rossmoor serves 8,000 community members through the resident Acalanes Adult Education Center. This site has not significantly benefited from previous local or state bonds. The district Master Plan states, "As the baby boomer population ages, the demand for programs and classrooms at this 50-year old campus continues to increase."

A brand new building is being constructed housing classrooms and administration offices. The plan is to have this building

completed by the end of December of this year. The Del Valle campus, in one of its older buildings, houses the technology servers and data center, which run the entire district computer system. There is a built-in generator to keep the data center alive in case of an emergency power loss. Amy Nichols says, "Acalanes is a great district to work in, and all the technology projects are done with instructional goals in mind." The approach is to move students well into the 21st century.

Also at Del Valle, an entirely new class-room for Special Needs students is being built. This room is for students in the program for adult transition to individual living. The ages for this group are 18 to 22 years, and the present student enrollment is 22 students for two full-time teachers. Fifteen students is the top number for one teacher.

Regarding technology, each school will have a new digital language lab installed. Laptops are provided at the schools at a cost of \$460 each, which are rubber coated to take more abuse, and each campus has two complete class sets of Think Pads. They are on mobile carts that can be taken to classrooms. The language lab system will be available 24/7. Presently, classes go to the lab with a teacher who directs class lab activities. Nichols says the district is

"looking at putting in a cloud system – available for PC and mobile phone use." The previous labs all ran by an analog system. Additionally, a new building will be constructed for the district's permanent technology office.

At Campolindo, a home economics room became a U.S. History classroom with possible use for art instruction. A new science classroom has been created from an old art room and hallway. This classroom has 18 personal computers as well as a "prep room" for experiment materials, and also a "Fume Hood" which is a machine in which chemicals are used but does not allow any toxic vapors outside into the room. Nickerson says the district is experiencing "a huge growth in science enrollment." The Video Production program has been upgraded with PC's integrated into the classroom. A new control room and sound booth have been built for recording, both adjacent to a sound stage for music, drama and speech practice and recording. Further renovations at Campo include modernization of the multi-use room (which currently includes the school cafeteria and a full theater stage) and additional landscaping, to be done in 2013.

Miramonte has gained a new concrete walk and retaining wall around the track to the visitor's side, which replaced an asphalt walk that was crumbling and sinking. Beginning this summer, the track and football field is being replaced. New artificial turf is being used because it reduces injuries. The track was originally installed in 2002 with a life of eight years. Thus, the replacement is two years overdue. The new track will have a life of eight years also but will have a higher ultra violet rating which should compute to a longer life. The old track was worn down and patch material had been used. This September should see the completion of the Mats' new track and field.

The new Culinary Arts classroom has three six-burner industrial stoves. Presently the school is trying to grow this program, which now only has three sections. Miramonte has the least enrollment in technology education programs due to its size, which has decreased from about 1350 to 1115 students in recent years. Nickerson says, "It is tough to grow programs when enrollment is shrinking." Las Lomas faces the same problem. Special Education has gained a renovated classroom and full facility ADA compliant rest room. Additional improvements include heating and air conditioning in the large gym and locker rooms.

Improvements listed above include the main renovations at each school with additional improvements also planned or in progress.

before the press release. We think our offers were satisfactory and addressed their issues significantly."

MOFD has provided IAFF Local 1230 with two final proposals, one of which would be in effect until June 30, 2013, and the other would be in effect through June 30, 2015. Due to the closed nature of the negotiations, the details of these proposals are not available. Weil said, "We have heard that one or both offers will be presented to the union members for their consideration. If neither offer is accepted by the members, then the next phase begins." Wells said, "We received these proposals via email and hadn't had a chance to present them to our members before they declared impasse."

The next phase is the State of California becoming involved. "The board had been advised that under new provisions of California law, the state will appoint what

amounts to a mediator who will engage in a 'fact finding' process with both sides," said Weil. "The mediator will deliver his or her views to both sides privately (it is not a public document), but neither side is bound by those views." Wells added, "The mediator tries to work with both sides to come to an agreement and see if we can find common ground."

According to Weil, either party is free to restart negotiations at any time during the process. "We have been advised that upon the completion of the process, if the parties have not reached an agreement, the district governing board may hold a public hearing for the purpose of imposing terms and conditions of employment for one year in accordance with the terms of its last, best and final one year offer, and may do so after that hearing."

larvae develops in your pet's bloodstream, where it can grow to a significant size and thrive in your animal's heart, lungs, and blood vessels. A well developed infestation can cause death. Treatment is difficult and lengthy as it involves the use of toxins to kill the heartworm. The most important way to protect your pet is by getting it on a rigorous schedule of heartworm preventive medication. But before such medication can be effective your pet must be free of heartworm to begin with.

Bay area pets, cats and dogs, are vulnerable to all three of these parasites and at least two of them – the tick and certainly the heartworm – can be deadly. Deterrents are readily available and are a small price to pay to ensure the health and well being of your best friends – your pets.



establishing the Center to help others fight the disease." In the 10 years Lamorinda tennis players have "played for the cure," over \$110,000 has been raised.




